4th Sunday of the Year Reflection

From the very beginning of the Gospel of Mark, Jesus goes through certain rituals that prime Him for service as God's true and authentic prophet. Jesus is baptised by John in the Jordan, and proclaimed to all as the Beloved Son of God. He then goes into the desert in order to discern His mission and also to be strengthened by the Spirit. In the desert Jesus overcomes the power of Satan. His public ministry begins with a statement and a challenge to his listeners: "The time has come, and the Kingdom of God is close at hand. Repent and believe the Good News". The words we heard in last week's Gospel. In true prophetic fashion Jesus claims the establishment of God's kingdom and then challenges the people on their behaviour: they are to repent and believe in the values he will present to them. In today's Gospel we see Jesus putting those words into practice. In the life and ministry of Jesus the authenticity of a true prophet is seen. He commands authorityan authority that comes from God-as he heals the man possessed by an unclean spirit. Jesus indeed has the authority of God to preach and minister in God's name. Ironically, He is recognised named and proclaimed, by the possessed man as "Jesus of Nazareth...the Holy One of God". Do we recognise Jesus and his authority over the powers of evil and sin? Are we ready to ask Him to free us from that power? Are we committed enough to Him to allow this continual conversion and transformation in our lives? Are we as baptised and confirmed members of the Church, commissioned by the same Spirit, willing to speak and act as Jesus in the world, as prophets? This is the mission of every baptised Christian. Are we ready and willing to be directed in our words and actions by this same Spirit? If we are, then we will truly live as authentic prophets of
